# THE HISTORY of United Cities and Local Governments Asia Pacific (UCLG ASPAC)

THE HISTORY of United Cities and Local Governments Asia Pacific (UCLG ASPAC) starts with the emergence of the International Union of Local Authorities (IULA)

IULA was established in 1913 in Belgium with its headquarters in The Hague, Netherlands, while IULA ASPAC, headquartered in Jakarta, was set up in September 1989 during the 29th IULA World Congress in Perth, Western Australia.

UCLG ASPAC is one of the Regional Sections of United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG), an amalgamation of International Union of Local Authorities, United Towns Organization (UTO), and World Association of the Major Metropolises (METROPOLIS). UCLG was established on 1 January 2004 and is headquartered in Barcelona, Spain.

Following this unification, UCLG ASPAC was established in Taipei on 14 April 2004, as the new entity of IULA ASPAC. UCLG ASPAC is the key knowledge management hub on local government issues in the Asia Pacific region, and the only officially recognized voice of local governments by the United Nations.

With connections to more than 7,000 cities and local governments, UCLG ASPAC represents well over 3.76 billion people – more than half of the world population, along with nations that are rapidly developing economically like China, India and Indonesia.

Primarily, UCLG ASPAC is to serve its member cities as a key knowledge hub on all local government issues in the Asia-Pacific region. It enables collaboration between cities, local governments and their associations, and it encourages democratic local governance.

It also makes partnerships, networks, and programmes to build capacity of local governments and its associations possible. Additionally, UCLG ASPAC advocates for local governments politically within the international community, including with the UN and its agencies.

Furthermore, UCLG ASPAC supports inclusive societies that uphold social and economic justice, equality, and sustainable development. The local economic development, climate change, disaster resiliency, culture, strategic planning, decentralisation, municipal finance, gender equality, women's leadership and environment, and good governance, are all the thematic fields in which UCLG ASPAC is actively involved.

## Here are the specific objectives of UCLG ASPAC:

- 1. To promote strong and effective democratic local self-government throughout the region/world by fostering unity and cooperation among members.
- 2. To ensure effective political representation of local government to the UN and other international communities.
- 3. To be the worldwide source of key information on local government, learning, exchange, and capacity building to support democratic local governments and their associations.
- 4. To promote economic, social, cultural, vocational and environmental development by enhancing the services to citizens based on good governance.
- 5. To promote race and gender equality, combating discrimination, promoting decentralised cooperation and international cooperation between local governments and their associations.
- 6. To promote twinning and partnership between local governments and peoples.

- 1. Decentralised cooperation (cities/local governments to cities/local governments exchange)
- 2. Advocacy
- 3. Capacity building and training
- 4. Research and knowledge management
- 5. Project development and management

Finally, in order to fulfill its purpose, UCLG ASPAC has also developed a Strategic Plan referred to as a Manifesto, with a particular emphasis on the Localisation of the Global Agenda, provision of equal and basic services, the significance of effective democratic self-governments and promotion of good governance. As the COVID-19 has brought various impacts, UCLG ASPAC's work also includes advocacy, and capacity building relating to the recovery of cities and local governments in the Asia-Pacific.

## Climate Resilience and Innovation Forum (CRIF) 2025:

Empowering Cities and Local Governments for a Climate-Resilient Future

Jakarta and Banyumas, Indonesia | 21-23 May 2025

#### A. Background

The world is on the brink of a climate catastrophe. The current report by the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) shows that the world's average mean temperature has increased by 1.55 degrees Celsius compared to the average mean temperature before the Industrial Revolution. The target of the Paris Agreement to limit temperature rise under 1.5 degrees Celsius is collapsing.

The main culprit behind this worrying data is the constantly increasing concentration of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reaching more than 520 PPM, way above the safe level of 350 PPM. The GHG emissions create a greenhouse effect that traps solar radiation in the earth's atmosphere. The more GHGs are released, the thicker the layer developed in the atmosphere that traps solar radiation inside the earth's atmosphere, causing the increase in temperature.

Global warming triggers more intense wet and dry weather phenomena, such as torrential rains, storms and prolonged dry seasons. The world has witnessed not only more severe "one in a hundred years" floods, like those in Pakistan and Spain, but also longer dry seasons that have increased the risk of fires in both rural and urban areas.

Cities are falling victim to the current climate crisis, and at the same time, cities also contribute to 70% of the world's GHGs emissions (Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific). As a result, cities and local governments are increasingly recognised as key actors in addressing climate challenges and SDGs. Hundreds of millions of people in poorer urban areas are hit by pockets of deprivation with a lack of basic infrastructure, including water and sanitation, while enduring more and more extreme weather and hydrometeorological disasters.

Problems worsen when the most fragile territories are affected by other global warming and climate change-induced disasters: rising sea levels, flooding, landslides, toxic peaks of air pollution, typhoons, storms, or periods of more extreme heat and droughts related to climate change.

Considering the urgency of climate resilience issues, there is a critical need for platforms where cities and local governments can enhance climate resilience, align with the Paris Agreement, and contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It is essential to support climate mitigation and adaptation actions through city-to-city cooperation, triangular cooperation between cities in Europe, South Asia, and Southeast Asia, and the mainstreaming of climate action planning. Additionally, accessing sustainable finance through collaborative efforts will be a key focus.

The Climate Resilience and Innovation Forum (CRIF) 2025, organised by UCLG ASPAC, aims to provide such a platform. The Forum will bring together representatives from national and local governments, policymakers, climate experts, international partners, and community leaders to collaborate on building climate-resilient cities. It will facilitate discussions, share best practices, and foster partnerships to strengthen the adaptive capacity of urban areas across the Asia-Pacific region. The Forum will also commemorate the completion of the Climate Resilience and Inclusive Cities (CRIC) project of UCLG ASPAC, which is co-funded by the European Union. The ten (10) pilot cities and partners of CRIC will present the achievements and results of the project. These include the launch of 10 Climate Action Plans (CAPS) prepared by cities to be handed over to the newly elected or re-elected mayors of the 10 pilot cities for implementation and integration into the Local Development Mid-Term Plan.







City-to-city cooperation, a flagship of UCLG ASPAC, will also be enhanced through a dedicated session to be held in cooperation with the Ministry of Home Affairs of Indonesia. The session aims to strengthen decentralised cooperation and effective partnerships for sustainable development. Another significant feature of the Forum will be an Introductory Session on the City and Local Government (CLG) Institute, a forthcoming initiative by UCLG ASPAC aimed at supporting evidence-based policymaking through research and knowledge management. The session will serve as an opportunity to present the initial framework and gather feedback from city and local government members. The CLG Institute also aims to consolidate and disseminate lessons learnt from the CRIC project for broader application.

Furthermore, UCLG ASPAC, as the host of the GCoM Southeast Asia (SEA) Secretariat, will also dedicate a special session to awarding GCoM (Global Covenant of Mayors) badges to cities demonstrating significant progress in climate action, with the badges being presented to Mayors and Governors in Southeast Asia.

Following the completion of CRIF 2025, a technical visit to Banyumas (approximately 363 km from Jakarta) will be conducted as requested by the CRIC's 10 pilot cities to replicate the successful implementation of solid waste management.

#### B. Goals and Objectives

The CRIF 2025 aims to:

- Facilitate collaboration among national and local governments, academia, and the private sector to develop effective strategies for climate resilience.
- 2. Showcase successful climate initiatives and share practical solutions for urban resilience, including policy development and community-based approaches.
- 3. Strengthen the capacity of policymakers and local leaders to implement climate strategies in line with the Paris Agreement and SDGs.
- 4. Promote inclusive climate resilience initiatives that consider the needs of all community groups, particularly vulnerable populations.
- 5. Enhance city-to-city cooperation and effective partnerships for sustainable development.

#### C. Expected Outputs and Outcomes

The expected outputs from the forum are:

- 1. Resource Launch: Successful launch of the 10 Climate Action Plans (CAPs) with a clear roadmap for implementation and CAPs Guideline.
- 2. Policy Commitments: Participating cities commit to implementing specific climate resilience strategies or policies presented during the Forum.
- 3. Knowledge Sharing: Publication of a summary report or toolkit featuring key insights and policy recommendations from the Forum.
- 4. GCoM Badge Awarding: Recognition of five to ten cities in Southeast Asia with GCoM badges, demonstrating tangible progress in climate action.
- 5. Follow-Up Initiatives: Creation of a post-event working group to monitor the progress of commitments made during the forum.
- 6. Learning and Inspiration: Facilitate a dedicated session or field visit for CRIC 10 pilot cities to gain insights from Banyumas' solid waste management transformation, addressing shared urban challenges, which will be documented for further replications.

The expected outcomes are as follows:

1. Enhanced Policy Alignment: Participating cities align their climate strategies with the Paris Agreement and the SDGs.







- 2. Increased Capacity for Climate Action: Policymakers and local leaders apply insights gained from the Forum to advance climate initiatives within their municipalities.
- Strengthened Networks and Collaboration: New and strengthened connections among governments, academia, the private sector, and international organisations to support ongoing climate resilience projects.
- 4. Visible Climate Leadership: CRIC Pilot Cities and GCoM badge awardees serve as role models, promoting best practices and inspiring other cities to adopt effective climate strategies.
- 5. Practical Application of Lessons Learned: CRIC 10 pilot cities implement lessons from Banyumas' waste management transformation, demonstrating practical progress in addressing local urban challenges.

#### D. Programme Details

The Forum will feature presentations, panel discussions, interactive sessions, and field visits. Key topics will include climate action technologies, financing resilience initiatives, gender-responsive climate action, and city-to-city and regional cooperation. A field visit to successful climate action projects in Jakarta and Banyumas will provide practical insights into effective strategies.

The event is expected to bring together approximately 300 participants, including national and local government representatives, climate experts, policymakers, practitioners, international partners, civil society organisations (CSOs), community-based organisations (CBOs), non-governmental organisations (NGOs), and youth leaders. Attendees will include local governments and stakeholders from CRIC pilot cities, CRIC implementing and strategic partners, external experts, UCLG ASPAC-invited members and partners, and members of the press.

#### E. Programme Format and Content

The CRIF 2025 will include:

- Networking sessions to encourage collaboration and knowledge exchange.
- An opening session with keynote addresses from influential leaders in climate resilience.
- Thematic sessions focusing on practical strategies for climate actions, policy frameworks, and communityled initiatives.
- Official launch of the CAPs Guideline and 10 Climate Action Plans (CAPs) by Mayors and city representatives, showcasing their achievements and strategies, supported by the European Union, UCLG ASPAC, and other international partners.
- Introduce the framework of the CLG Institute and a GCoM badge awarding ceremony to celebrate cities' climate achievements, with badges presented to Mayors, Governors, and Regents.
- A learning visit to Jakarta to explore nature-based solutions and to Banyumas to examine successful waste management transformation, offering practical insights and inspiration for local governments to address their urban challenges.

#### F. Additional Information

- Language: English will be the primary language, with interpretation services provided for Bahasa Indonesia and sign language.
- Weather: Jakarta in May is warm and humid, with possible rainfall. Participants are advised to prepare accordingly.
- Travel Guide: Jakarta is well-connected via Soekarno–Hatta International Airport (CGK), with convenient transport options to the event venue.

The event is organised by UCLG ASPAC in collaboration with the Jakarta Special Capital Region and with support from the European Union. The CRIF 2025 aims to be a high-visibility event, fostering inclusive dialogue and delivering practical outcomes to enhance climate resilience across the Asia-Pacific region.
